Prepositions



What is a Preposition?

Prepositions are some of the trickiest words to learn in English because they must be learned through memorization and practice. Prepositions are words that help show the relationship of nouns and pronouns — also known as objects — to the other words inside a sentence in terms of time, place, or direction. Sometimes, prepositions can also indicate relationships like cause, manner or amounts. Prepositions almost always come before nouns or pronouns.

Place / Direction Prepositions

on: Don't put that hat <u>on</u> your head. (in contact with a surface)

over: The picture is <u>over</u> the couch/sofa in front of: The next person in line is

in front of me.

in: The money is in my pocket.

(inside an area)

under: The dog is sitting <u>under</u> the table.
behind: I will walk <u>behind</u> you in line.
next to: The person is sitting <u>next to</u> her.

between: Spring is between winter and summer.

among: We are among friends.

above: The plane is flying **above** the clouds.

into: The train went <u>into</u> the tunnel. at: I will meet you at the entrance.

Time Prepositions

in: My parents will not visit me <u>in</u> April.

on: I like to relax on my birthday.

at: I will meet you at six o'clock. since: I have known Jill since college.

Helpful tips

When using "last," "next," "every" or "this," do not use "in," "on," or "at"

Examples:

I was sick last May (not in last May).

I'm planning to go on vacation **next** Monday. (not on next Monday).

I eat turkey **every** Thanksgiving day. (not at Thanksgiving day).

I will take a walk **this** evening. (not on this evening).
